Australia's Youth Unemployment Just Getting Worse!

August 2013

There's a serious crisis for young people particularly teenagers who are finding it hard to get full time employment and it's an issue I'm concerned and passionate about.

Almost all the countries newspapers have been running articles the last 8 months on this topic and are predicting "a youth unemployment crisis amid an explosion in the number of young people actively looking for a job and living on welfare payments".

Australia is running the risk of creating its own European-style "lost generation" of youth, with unemployment rates for young people in some parts of Melbourne and Sydney running at almost four times the national average.

Not only has unemployment increased for 15- to 19-year-olds, there has been a decline in labour force participation for 15 to 19-year-olds over the past five years. From a high of 60% for most of 2008, it is now 54.6%. This means that there has been a withdrawal of young people from the labour market, either looking for work or in work.

The reason why youth unemployment is such an urgent policy issue is that if young people miss the opportunity of a good start in the labour market, it just gets harder and harder every month they can't get their first job and get that foothold. It is often the case that if unemployment increases, people will withdraw from looking for work because of discouragement.

Teenagers without skills may have been able to get a job in a factory or on the railways in the past but those jobs no longer exist. The structural change to the economy means you really have to have an education to get into the labour market.

Monash University Associate Professor Lucas Walsh said with youth unemployment figures closing in on all-time heights of 20 per cent, there was now an enormous job vacuum harming teen workers' efforts to find employment.

"School leavers have found it's very difficult to find a job for a number of reasons in recent years, particularly given the impact of the economic downturn of retail. Unemployment rates among teenage males not in full-time education rose from 18 per cent last year to nearly 20 per cent this year".

The fact is the economy is not generating jobs at anything like the pace needed to keep up with the growth in the adult population. Even after we allow for people retiring, the jobs market is weak, and getting weaker and it's the young who suffer. Nathan Chanesman MyCareerMatch

Students who disengage from learning are the most at risk of not being employed full time and the reason for this is that they are missing out on developing the basic skills required by employers.

Often, if these students find employment they do not find security as they will go from one job to another getting fired or giving up because it is too difficult to learn having missed out on how to learn as a school student.

Students who have real success in securing employment are those who recognise the need to manage their learning and who have goals in place to move into further education and training and to find work.

These students will:

- Have a personal vision and goals
- Be able to evaluate and monitor their own performance
- Have knowledge and confidence in their own ideas and vision
- Be able to articulate their own ideas and vision and
- Take responsibility

These very important self-management skills will lead to job growth and satisfaction over time.

SCHOOL ENGAGEMENT PREDICTS SUCCESS LATER IN LIFE

Children's interest and engagement in school influences their prospects of educational and occupational success 20 years later, over and above their academic attainment and socioeconomic background, researchers have found.

The more children felt connected to their school community and felt engaged, rather than bored, the greater their likelihood of achieving a higher educational qualification and going on to a professional or managerial career.

The study from researchers at Menzies Research Institute Tasmania is <u>published</u> in the British Educational Research Journal.

The researchers used data from the <u>Childhood Determinants of Adult Health</u> study, which collected health-related data from school children aged nine to 13 years, and again 20 years later when they were young adults.

The research team created a "school engagement index" using questionnaire items on school enjoyment and boredom, including items such as motivation to learn, sense of belonging, participation in school or extra-mural activities and enjoyment of physical activity.

They found that each unit of school engagement was independently associated with a 10% higher chance of achieving a post-compulsory school education at some point during the next 20 years, including as a mature age student. And those who were engaged at school were more likely to go on to a professional, semi-professional or managerial career.

Lead author Joan Abbott-Chapman, University Associate at the Menzies Research Institute Tasmania, said the study was an important confirmation for teachers and educators that what happens in school has life-long consequences. "If students can be engaged by curriculum, through the mode of delivery, through a rich variety of learning experiences and through the way teachers relate with students, then this is going to pave the way for achievement in adulthood," she said.

Parents also have an enormous influence over their child's educational participation, Dr Abbott-Chapman said, but they could take heart that even students from socioeconomically disadvantaged backgrounds could be encouraged to achieve success.

"If parents are able to co-operate with schools and teachers to help to promote student engagement, then this is likely to provide a springboard, if you like, for future achievement in school and in employment right through to adulthood," she said.

Improving engagement

Senior Lecturer at Flinders University Dr Susan Krieg said the study reinforced the importance of school curricula to promote active, rather than passive learning styles that engage both the mind and body, and involve humour, music and movement.

"It is important to recognise that the patterns of engagement begin very early, much earlier than formal schooling," Dr Krieg added.

Professor of Global Health at the University of Melbourne Rob Moodie agrees.

"The notion that a school should be about sports, music, drama – not only numeracy and literacy – is really important. They enjoy it, they enjoy being there."

Professor Moodie said the link between educational and occupational outcomes also extended to better health outcomes and well-being later in life.

Levelling the playing field at school

Dr Fiona Mensah, Postdoctoral Research Fellow at Murdoch Childrens Research Institute, said children who become marginalised at school often have <u>very negative outcomes</u>.

"Disengagement is strongly predictive of school dropout, delinquency and problem substance use in adolescence and early adulthood – emphasising how critical it is that children remain engaged during schooling as they transition to adulthood," she said.

The next step for this type of research, according to Louise Newman, Professor of Psychiatry at Monash University, is to look at whether a school environment can function as a protective environment for children who are at risk of disengagement.

"So that would look at things like children with family difficulties or children with attachment problems, or children from low socioeconomic areas, or children where a family might not promote or value education."

Pathways to University Study

Yapug offers flexible study options. You can enter the program in either March or July and you can choose to study:

- Full-time over one year (two semesters); or
- Part-time over two years (three or four semesters).

The maximum time allowed to complete the program is two years.

The program is offered at the Newcastle campus at Callaghan, a modern campus set in a bushland environment, 12 kilometres from the Newcastle city centre. It is easily accessed by public transport.
