PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

At this time of the year the school is heavily involved in evaluating what it has done in the current year, as well planning for the year ahead. It's an exciting time, and also a very hectic one for all of the staff. 2016 has been a terrific year for our school and we look forward immensely to the opportunities that will be presented in 2017. There is great excitement mounting as we get closer to the final design of our new building. It really is going to be something quite extraordinary! This has been a long process with some obstacles placed in the way. I would like to thank our school community for their ongoing support.

As part of our evaluation of 2016, St Clair High School was involved in a process of External Validation. This process involves a team of two peer principals viewing the evidence the school provides and the self-assessment process of the school. Our school took the unusual step of having students on our panel to discuss the impact of our work on those most important in our setting, the students. I would like to thank Renay Xuereb (11), Tahlia Brown (7) and Eddie Faamausili Paese (7) for their contributions.

Our Year 10 students are in the process of working through their yearly examinations and will shortly be engaged in various activities in the lead up to them moving into their years of senior schooling. This includes their "sign out" procedures from the junior school, Graduation Ceremony, return of equipment and payment of outstanding fees before commencing their new subjects in 2017. On the subject of outstanding fees, if any parents are having financial difficulty affecting their ability to meet these obligations please feel free to contact me to arrange an installment agreement and / or Student Assistance. As most parents would by now be aware, we are no longer allowing students to pay for non-essential activities whilst they have outstanding debts, unless an agreement has been reached for financial assistance.

In the weeks ahead the majority of our students in Years 7-9 will be engaged in end of year examinations and / or assessment tasks, in the lead up to the production of Yearly Reports. It is important for all of these students that they are spending time at home studying, reviewing their class notes and focusing upon achieving their "Personal Best." I would like to say "Well done" to two groups of students and the teachers who have worked so well with them. Our outgoing Year 12 made us all very proud with the way they conducted themselves at the Year 12 Graduation and Year 12 Formal. They were superb. Now that the HSC has just finished, we look forward to, and anticipate, very strong results in the HSC.

Our incoming Year 12 has recently completed the Australian Business Week (ABW) program and they have already

shown a capacity to "step up" to the high standards set by our recent Year 12 cohorts. The way the students committed themselves to the program throughout the week was superb. I would also like to thank the amazing team of staff and community helpers that make this program such a success.

Junior Students

A reminder that students in Years 7 to 10 are not permitted to leave the school grounds at any time during the school day (8.25 am - 2.30 pm) without signing out at the Roll Office. Students seeking permission to leave are asked to bring a signed note from a parent that they have signed by one of the Deputy Principals before 8.25 am. The student then shows their teacher the note at the time they need to leave and then sign out at the Roll Office. Students in Years 7 to 10 are not permitted to leave the school grounds during recess and lunch breaks to visit the shopping centre.

HSC Examinations

Year 12 have now completed their HSC examinations and clearance procedures at St Clair High School. They will eagerly await their HSC results in December and their ATAR and University placements. The staff at St Clair High look forward to hearing what pathway this cohort will pursue next.

Year 6 Orientation Day

On Thursday 6th December our Year 7 cohort for 2017 will be attending the Year 6 Orientation Day. Mr McCarthy will be their Year Adviser and has already been working with groups of students in Year 6 along with Mr Whiley to ensure that their transition to high school is positive. The Orientation Day will commence at 9 am in the School Hall. The School Uniform Shop will be in operation on this day.

Year 10 into 11 Enrolment Day

On Thursday 8th December our current Year 10 group along with students who are enrolling in Year 11 2017 will be required to attend a clearance and enrolment meeting. This is where we formally welcome our Year 11 cohort for 2017 to St Clair High School and also pass on information regarding school requirements, course requirements, the Senior School Charter and the payment of course costs. The day will be split with students whose surnames start with letters A-K commencing their clearance procedures at 9am and concluding at 9.45am. Their enrolment process will commence at the start of Period 2 in the school hall. Students whose surnames start with letters L-Z will commence their clearance process during Period 3. The enrolment process for these students will take place during Period 4 in the school hall. The School Uniform Shop will be operating on this day. There will be facilities for parents to pay subject fees on this day at the front office. Families who are unable to meet this requirement at this time will be required to enter into an agreement to pay the subject fees at a convenient time or through an instalment arrangement.

Year 10 Graduation Ceremony

The Year 10 graduation ceremony will take place on Monday 12th December at 6pm. Students will need to be at school by 5.30pm in full school uniform. This event for most students marks the transition from the junior school to the senior school. For a small number of students this will be their last formal event at St Clair High School. We wish them all the best in their future endeavours.

Uniform

It is pleasing to see so many students making a genuine effort with uniform this term. It is vital that students wear the correct uniform at St Clair High School including appropriate leather footwear each day. If students cannot wear the correct school uniform, they must provide a note from their parent/carer with the valid reason. Students must take this note to their Year Adviser, Assistant Year Adviser or Head Teacher Welfare. Students with a valid reason for not wearing the correct uniform will be issued with a Uniform Pass to show to staff.

Any student who is genuinely unable to comply with the school uniform requirements due to financial reasons is expected to make contact with the school Principal, Deputy Principals or Head Teacher Welfare at their earliest convenience. Arrangements will be made at the school to assist the student to comply with the school's dress code.

We continue to ask for the support of our parent/caregiver community with the correct wearing of uniform for all our students.

Please be reminded that St Clair High School recognises that the wearing of school uniforms by students will assist our school community to increaseing the personal safety of students and staff by allowing easier recognition of visitors and potential intruders in the school defining an identity for the school within its community, developing students' sense of belonging to the school community and providing an opportunity to build school spirit.

Peers Support Program

Peer Support at St Clair High School is a peer led, skills based, experiential learning program that empowers young people to support each other and contribute positively to society. It provides students with a supportive learning environment in which to develop the skills, understandings, attitudes and strategies to improve their mental, social and emotional wellbeing. Students involved in the program develop key skills in resilience, assertiveness, decision making, problem solving and leadership.

Led by our wonderful coordinators, Ms Roslyn Salt and Mr Aaron McCarthy, our outgoing Peers Support Leaders have done a wonderful job with our junior students and we congratulate them for all their efforts.

Beat the Heat

With the hot weather already starting, there are a variety of measures that can be used to support students. To assist students in hot weather, staff at St Clair High School:

- Encourage students to drink water and allowing drink bottles (water only) in the classroom.
- Altering timetables or programs to avoid physical activity or the use of sporting equipment that may generate heat.
- Useing fans or other devices in an appropriate way to remain cool.

Parents can assist by:

- Sending their children to school with a water bottle (it can be a good idea to freeze the water overnight so it's nice and cold the next day)
- Encourage your child to wear a hat
- Encourage your child to apply sunscreen before they head off to school.

Wellbeing

Bullying and cyber bullying

With kids' increasing access to mobile phones and the internet, bullying can happen any time – even when you think your child is tucked up safely in bed.

Bullying is any form of repeated behaviour that is intended to cause harm and is characterised by an imbalance of power. In traditional face-to-face bullying it can include name-calling, put-downs, threats, teasing, physical abuse or property damage. It can also include being left out, ignored or being the subject of rumours or dirty looks, or being stalked, intimidated or manipulated.

Cyber bullying is a form of 'covert bullying', meaning it's hidden or not seen by adults. It happens when mean messages or compromising photos are passed around about a person to others using technology such as mobile phones or social networking sites such as Facebook or MySpace.

If your child has been bullied

It is hard to find a worse feeling than when your child is being bullied. You feel angry at the injustice of it and just want to fix it for them. Listen sympathetically; let them know that it was not their fault. Give your child some guidelines on what they can do. Sometimes by acting assertively or not overreacting, the bullying can be stopped.

Kids who are bullied often avoid telling an adult (including their parents) because they fear the technology will be taken away from them or it will just make the situation worse. If you are aware of school-related bullying issues, encourage your child to tell a teacher they trust, their Year Adviser, Assistant Year Adviser or Head Teacher Welfare.

Installing the programs will place a OneDrive folder on your device. This folder will sync to the cloud regularly and any files here can be modified offline. Once One Drive connects online again, it will automatically sync your data.

As you may be aware, the Science department has been evaluating a brand new Australian science resource - Cosmos Lessons - with the view to using it more extensively in 2017. Cosmos Lessons is truly the next-generation of science learning. Built by a team of Australian Teachers and Scientists, it takes relevant, interesting science news and teaches the scientific concepts behind the news. The curriculum is accessed online, featuring rich explanations, videos, illustrations and simulations that are engaging for students.

Cosmos Lessons is made available through a purpose-built, secure website meaning that:

- All course materials, student work, and feedback from teachers is in one place for students, and never gets lost.
- Students can access the resource at school, at home, or on the go. Anywhere with an internet connection.
- Teachers can view and monitor student work in real-time, so we can identify misconceptions earlier than ever before.
- The program can be tailored to the needs of individual students, providing the appropriate level of support and extension.
- It significantly reduces the need for printouts or textbooks, although the lessons can be printed if required.
- Built-in digital lab book for experiments allows students to capture their practical reports in the one place, including video and photo evidence.

I encourage you to log in with your son or daughter and take a closer look at the rich materials, their work and the associated feedback they've received from us. The lessons are available via a password-protected website.

JONATHAN JONES 32ND KALDOR PUBLIC ART PROJECT

The last day of term three **Kiesha Finnie**, **Tianna Gallacher**, **Amelia Cavanagh**, **Tamsyn Cowens-Dixon and Miss Rainsford** attended the Jonathan Jones Art Project which was held in the Botanic Garden, Sydney. It is called *barrangal dyara (skin and bones)*, and was the very first Kaldor Public Art Project produced with an Aboriginal Australian Artist.

This major contemporary art project recalls the 19th century Garden Palace building where it originally stood in the Royal Botanic Garden, Sydney, between 1879 and 1882 before it

devastatingly burnt to the ground. *Barrangal dyara (skin and bones)* increases the visibility of a moment of significant cultural loss for the region, the nation, and expressly for Indigenous Australians. The project connects directly with Indigenous communities in Sydney and greater South-East Australia to develop key elements of the work, collaborating to reframe Australian history for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

Jones created a large-scale sculptural installation positioned across the **20,000 square metres** of the garden on the building's original site. Native kangaroo grassland and thousands of three different ceramic shields blanketed the site which was activated by language and soundscapes.

The students listened to Jonathan Jones talk about his art project and after that the students had a guided tour of the whole site, by a Kaldor Education Officer. The students learnt about the history of the three different traditional shields, the Garden Palace, the history and uses of kangaroo grass and the interpretations and meaning of the Indigenous languages. After that we had hands-on demonstrations from Indigenous Education officers about medicinal plants and their properties from the Royal Botanical Garden. The students also learnt about bush tucker and tasted homemade bread made from the Kangaroo grass and lemongrass tea. The students also learnt about Indigenous artefacts from traditional Aboriginal cultures.

The students were outstanding and experienced and learnt a lot of knowledge and made connections to

St Clair High School is starting an initiative this year which seeks to support women and children experiencing domestic violence. In doing so, we have teamed up with local service, WASH House. WASH House is a meeting place for women and aims to reduce isolation by increasing connectedness and access to services. It offers a range of services including counselling, family support and assistance to women who want to end a violent relationship.

Women and children leaving domestic violence often leave with nothing but the clothes on their back. If we can help them transition to a safe refuge or accommodation quickly and easily, it can really make a difference.

We are putting together emergency kits, called "Grab N Go Kits". These kits will contain supplies a woman (and children) may need if they are fleeing domestic violence. We are appealing for contributions by the St Clair community. This may be by putting your own kit together or by supplying individual items for kits. Any old handbags or tote bags would also be great for the items to go in.

- Here is a list of helpful items that may give you some ideas.

 Toothpaste and tooth brushes (include some kids ones)
- Deodorant
- Shampoo
- Hair ties
- Travel sized hair combs/brushes
- Sanitary pads
- Colouring books and textas/crayons/pencils for kids
- Small soft toys for cuddling (children who are scared really respond to the comfort of a cuddle toy)
- Chap stick or lip balm
- Sunscreen

Murama "The Gathering" as well as Youth Summit, 2016

On the 16th-18th October the youth from across the country gathered in Sydney to share their knowledge of Aboriginal and the Torres Strait Islanders. Three of our Year 8 students Kiesha Finnie, Tamsyn Cowen-Dixon and Tianna Gallacher, the Chaplain Mr Josh Piper and Miss Rainsford participated in Murama Youth Leaders camp. "Murama" means "A Youth led event connecting youth from around Australia and Internationally to celebrate and share Indigenous cultures". Murama is about sharing culture, language and education experiences with young people learning and growing together. The three day camp was held at The Lodge the Armony, Newington, Homebush. The camp was to build and develop advance leadership skills and for students to "Step Up" and "Stand Tall" to lead with some outstanding leadership which were passed onto future non-indigenous and indigenous Students for the 2016 Murama Youth Summit in 2016.


The three days were full of fun and cultural knowledge and was an opportunity for the Indigenous youth to connect with Aboriginal Elders and learn about their culture and develop skills to share the cultural journey with others. The emerging leader then led over 200 local students in activities unique to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. Students participated in an array of Aboriginal Cultural, Torres Strait Islander cultural activities such as contemporary and traditional dance, performance, Indigenous games, storytelling, traditional and history of identities, the stolen generations, cross cultures from American Indians, art, indigenous language, traditional games and bush tucker.

Our 2nd day began with a "Welcome to County" and a traditional smoking ceremonial, this was presented by Uncle Greg (Elder) and Dr John Hunter. This was enjoyed by all it was very moving and spiritual. In the evening we all listened to stories about the American Indians and participated in traditional dance and games, the American Indians spoke about their culture and history.

WHAT IS AN APPRENTICESHIP OR TRAINEESHIP?

An Australian Apprenticeship, commonly known as an apprenticeship or traineeship, is a learning pathway that combines paid on-the-job training and formal study with a Registered Training Organisation. It's


YEAR 10 COMMERCE BUSINESS DAY

Please ensure that if your child calls you, that you refer them to the front office and then contact the school to advise them of the call you have received before coming to the school.


