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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It's been another terrific year at St Clair High School! Schools are dynamic organisations that often form the hub of the community. St Clair is no different. There have been some challenges with the new building commencing. As a school our fitness levels have improved immensely with access to E Block being via some very steep scaffolding. The new building is taking shape and the tiered seating space is near completion. There has been some frustration with the quality of the surface. I have refused to sign off on this. As a result the basketball court area will be excavated in the school holidays and a new surface put down. This is very inconvenient but we will not compromise on this vital piece of infrastructure. Each month we update the P&C on building progress and seek their input.

We have received bucket loads of recognition from many organisations for the achievements of students and staff in Academic, Sporting, Community Service and Performing Arts areas. It truly has been another extraordinary 12 months.



School is primarily about teaching and learning in the classroom and I want to publicly thank our teachers for their efforts in 2017. You may not realise it, but in addition to all of their everyday work and their after school contributions, most of our staff has also given up 3 full weekends during the year to spend time on developing their teaching skills further. That's 6 full days of voluntary work on this aspect alone – amazing!

I also want to make special mention of our Head Teachers. IF YOUR CHILD HAS ANAPHYLAXIS SHOULD HE OR SHE CARRY THEIR OWN EPIPEN® OR ANAPEN® TO AND AT SCHOOL?

What is this article about?

If you have told the school that your child is diagnosed a risk of anaphylaxis you should have received a letter from our school asking to assist us to develop a Health Care plan. This article provides more information about anaphylaxis.

What is an EpiPen® and an Anapen®?

EpiPen® and Anapens® are the emergency treatment for children who are having an anaphylactic reaction.

What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. If your child has been diagnosed by a doctor as being at risk of anaphylaxis there are some important things to remember that will help the school to support your child's health care needs.

Why you need to keep us informed if your child is diagnosed as being at risk of anaphylaxis or if his or her condition changes. This includes if they have an anaphylactic reaction while not at school.

The school can only respond to risks it knows about. Please keep Mrs Owston informed so that we can plan to support your child at St Clair High School.

Why you need to provide the school with your child's current ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis and an EpiPen® or Anapen® signed by their doctor

The plan sets out the steps the school needs to follow in an emergency. It is essential for us to have this to keep your child safe. We will keep a copy of your child's ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis stored with your child's EpiPen® or Anapen®.

Why it is important to talk regularly with your child about some simple steps to help keep them safe

It is important to regularly talk with your child about when and where they are at risk of contact with the things they are allergic to and how to avoid this. If you have told them not to take part in sharing food at school, regularly remind them of this.

Reassure them that if they do come into contact with something they are allergic to or they feel unwell at school they won't get into trouble. **They need to tell a teacher immediately.**

Consider whether your child should carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen®

If your child has been diagnosed with anaphylaxis you can request that they carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen® to school and at school. A request form has been sent home and is also available from Mrs Beamer, our Head Teacher Welfare.

If you request that your child carry an EpiPen® or Anapen® with them to school and at school you will still need to provide the school with at least one additional EpiPen® or Anapen® for storage in a central location within the school and for access by staff in an emergency.

The school will contact you about any request you make for your son or daughter to carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen®.

Why does the school need to know if your son or daughter is carrying their own EpiPen® or Anapen®?

Staff need to know your child carries an EpiPen® or Anapen® in an emergency. For this reason this information will be included in your child's individual health care plan.

They also need to be able to find it quickly so it is important that it be in an easily identifiable and accessible spot (eg. not a locker).

DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' REPORT

As the year comes to a close Mrs Shepherd and Mrs Dickson would like to thank students and their parents for their support during 2017. Without this support in terms of time and reinforcing the need to maintain St Clair High School as a safe, respectful place of learning where students are able to achieve their Personal Best, our job would be more difficult. School Uniform

During the summer vacation many families purchase items of school uniform. A reminder that shoes for practical subjects must be enclosed leather, either black or white. Like your own work places we must meet Workplace Health and Safety legislation.

The school's image is enhanced by all students complying with the school's uniform policy. School uniform not only demonstrates pride in your school, it also is a safety feature as it allows staff to easily identify students. School shirts, pants and jackets/jumpers are available from the School Uniform Shop. The Uniform Shop is located in the School Hall near Endeavour Avenue. It will be open from January 23 in 2018.

Safety to and from school

In planning for the 2018 school year we would ask parents to reinforce the safety measures that can be taken when students are moving to and from school. It is always advisable that students walk home with friends or brothers and sisters rather than alone. When crossing roads students need to be aware that vehicles have right of way. When using pedestrian crossings they also need to wait for vehicles to stop before proceeding onto the crossing. It is also important that students who choose to travel to school on bikes, scooters or skateboards do so in a safe manner. Students travelling to and from school are visible ambassadors for the school in the broader community.

Student Achievement

We are continually amazed at the scope of achievement from students and staff at St Clair High School and this continued in 2017. We feel privileged to be able to be part of celebrating their success. This time of the year allows us to recognise a broad range of student achievement at both the Year 10 Graduation and Presentation Evening. It is a fantastic time to celebrate success with all members of the school community.

Some safety messages – please help!

From time to time it's important to remind everyone about some things that need constant attention. We ask every parent for your understanding and support in relation to the following;

- ◆ Full school uniform includes the correct footwear. No parent should allow their son or daughter to come to school without safe footwear. Fashionable canvas shoes, no matter what colour are not safe and should not be worn to school under any circumstances. Yes, everyone, both junior and senior students!
- ◆ Deodorant sprays are a health hazard to some of our students and staff. Please understand that some people suffer from Asthma and other related respiratory conditions and spray deodorants can cause a serious risk to them. Please don't allow your children to bring these to school. Also, if your child does suffer from Asthma we ask that you provide the school with your child's Asthma Action Plan. Pro-formas are available from our Library SASS staff to assist you in the preparation of this important document.
- ◆ Please be aware that the school day starts at 8-30am. Students are expected to be at school when the warning bell rings at 8-25am, ready to start period 1 at 8-30am.

Have you changed your address or phone details?

Please let us know the new details immediately.

If you don't let us know, and something happens to your child requiring us to contact you urgently

If there's an emergency we need to be able to reach you!

In the interest of safety, please help us out!

From time to time it's understandable that your son or daughter may become unwell at school. We have strict procedures in place to manage these situations. This involves contact by the school administrative staff to a parent, caregiver or emergency contact person. This contact must come through the school, not directly to you from your son's or daughter's mobile phone. There have been some occasions when students have used their phone from a classroom (which is in breach of school policy anyway) and asked a parent to come to school to collect them. When the parent arrives, the school is unaware that the student is sick or has called the parent. Please ensure that if your child calls you, that you refer them to the front office and then contact the school to advise them of the call you have received before coming to the school.

A word of caution!

Most people get pretty excited about the amazing advances we are exposed to in the area of technology. Digital cameras, mobile phones that can do just about anything and cute little listening devices are all amongst the array of things to which we have easy access. Like most things though, there can be a catch. All students and parents need to be aware that it is potentially a breach of privacy legislation to take photographs or make recordings of any sort without the knowledge of the subject. That is especially the case if the photo or recording is distributed in any way without the consent of the subject. This includes the posting of such images on the internet in places like You Tube or Facebook. Please ensure that your children are aware that they should not take and "post" photos or videos of other people without their consent.

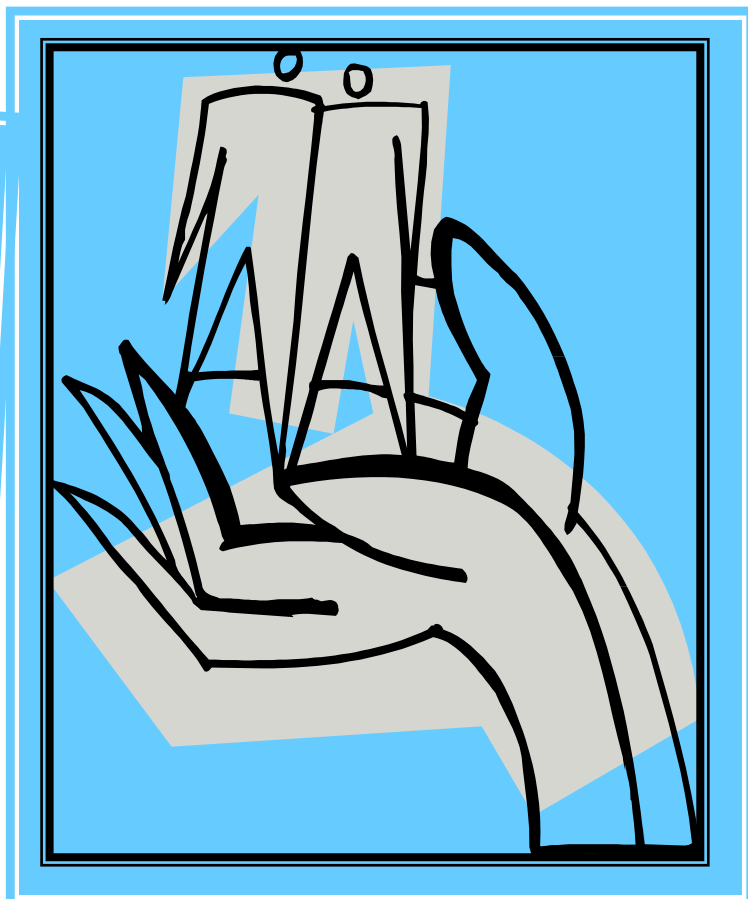
