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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Not surprisingly we are well and truly back into our normal routines for this time of year. There is a lot of productive work happening in classrooms right across the school. Years 7 and 9 are just completing the 2018 NAPLAN tests and other year groups are gearing up for Half Yearly examinations and assessment tasks. Last year we achieved some great results with NAPLAN, with student growth exceeding that of growth across the state.

There is an enormous amount packed into this term, including the afore-mentioned tasks, as well as our first semester reports. For all students we have an expectation that study routines will step up as we approach the examination period, and we ask parents for support in emphasising with your children the importance of doing this. Revision of work covered during the day, completion of designated homework, assignments and assessment tasks, and a regular pattern of reading are all part of this process.

Next week the placement panel will be working through the many, many non-local enrolment applications we receive for Year 7 2019. Anyone who actually knows anything about our school and its qualities won't be surprised to discover that we are certainly the school of choice in this area. As has been the case in recent years we expect about 70 non-local applications and it takes our panel quite a while to go through these to determine who we will accept. For those who would like to understand a little more about why our school is in this position, you can find all the facts and figures in our Annual School Report which contains very detailed information about our school, our student profile and achievements, and our academic performance in all external examinations. It is available for download from the school website. I encourage all members of our community to read it as it really demonstrates just how well this school provides a terrific learning environment for the students.

Many parents have already downloaded our free St Clair High School phone app. It's a really quick and easy way to stay in touch and communicate with the school. For those who haven't downloaded it yet I encourage you to do so. For those who have, an upgrade has recently been completed which can be downloaded from either the Play Store for Androids, or the Apple store for iPhones. This is a very easy way to receive updates and alerts from the school! You should also follow the school on Facebook, we find that Facebook is used extensively in our community and by our graduates.

Our student leaders represented our school with great dignity at the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at St Marys RSL and at the St Marys ANZAC march. It is important that our students are involved in and aware of the significance of such events, and equally important that our community is aware of how well our students carry themselves on such occasions.

We have also had a lot of very positive media coverage in both local and metropolitan newspapers, recognising the wide array of student achievements at St Clair High. It's always a great delight to see our students recognised so publicly.

Building Update

Hang in there, we have nearly made it! We should be in the last term of construction – this has been a great achievement not only for our school but our community. When I think about what we have achieved together, it brings a tear to my eye. I am so privileged to work in this work in this community.

The ball courts are due for completion at the end of this month. The rebound service has begun to be layed. The adhesive that will be used may create some fumes.

The canteen has moved back to its original location and we expect the Department's Demountable Unit will extract the first of our demountables this term.

The building is progressing well; the scaffolding will start to come down shortly so that you can see the architectural features. The date for handover is still 9th July, 2018, if this deadline is met, the first classes will take place Day 1, Term 3, 2018. A transition team has been engaged to assist with the move out of the demountables and into the new building.

The demountables will be moved out and the oval restored during Term 3.

The best way to keep informed will be through our normal communications channel and by attending our P&C meeting. Our next P&C meeting will be Tuesday 16th May at 7pm in the Common Room in the administration block.

DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' REPORT

NAPLAN

Year 7 and 9 will be completing their NAPLAN testing in Week 3. Miss Holt, HT Teaching and Learning, and the wonderful Learning Support team organised the tests and will provide students with the best opportunities to demonstrate their Personal Best. Families were provided with lots of supporting information leading up to these tests. In the media there is always lots of publicity regarding the pressure the exams place upon students or the results of the exams. However, this is just one measure used to asses a student's progress. The results are used as a diagnostic tool to identify areas individual students required extra assistance as well as identify particular strengths and areas for development for the different cohorts. We always remind students that NAPLAN is one test on one day – it does not provide a full picture of a student's ability. It does, however, provide us all with valuable information to support all students. Results will be available later this year. If any parent believes that their son or daughter needs additional assistance they should contact Mrs Sharma as the Learning Support teacher, or the year adviser of their child's year.

Year 11 Camp

Mr Thurtell and a team of teachers will accompany Year 11 on their Cross Roads Camp at Tea Gardens this week. Students from previous years have always been full of praise and extremely positive about this fantastic camp. Those students who cannot attend will be provided with an alternate program organised by Ms Morrison. This program is a mandatory requirement for all Year 11 students and covers a wide range of material including team work, resilience and safe social behaviours. Congratulations to all staff and students involved.

Assessment Period

Mid-way through Term 2 will see students in Years 7-10 involved in a formal assessment period. Many courses will take this opportunity to have students complete their Half Yearly Examinations. Attendance during this period is vital. Students are always invited to use the Homework Centre for additional support. This is open on Wednesday afternoons. We wish all students every success during this assessment period.

Students in Year 11 and 12 need to ensure that they regularly refer to their Preliminary and HSC Assessment guides and organise their time effectively in order to meet individual subject assessment requirements. Please ask questions if you unsure of anything. In the senior years processes do change due to requirements of NESA for the HSC credential. If senior students are absent for a formal assessment task they must follow the correct processes, including providing a medical certificate and completing a misadventure form. The school should also be contacted on the day of an assessment task if a student is unable to attend.

Wearing of School Uniform

Thank you to the many parents who ensure their children come to school in their full school uniform including the wearing of enclosed leather shoes on a daily basis. It is expected that students wear school uniform during school hours, travelling to and from school and when engaged in school based activities out of normal school hours unless indicated otherwise by the Principal. We are fortunate to have a school uniform shop operated on Tuesday by the friendly staff which enables parents to purchase uniform items. You can also purchase second hand uniform from Mrs Owston at a reasonable price. We as a staff and community actively promote the wearing of school uniform and leather shoes. PE shirts are not a part of regular school uniform and should not be worn to school by students but brought to school and changed into for PE and Sport. Positive comments are made regularly to our students who support the school ethos, have pride in their school and represent it well.

Inadequate footwear can be a Work Health and Safety (WHS) issue for our students and may prevent them from actively participating in their learning and satisfactorily achieving their learning outcomes. The responsibility for managing the implementation of a school uniform should be shared by the school, parents and students.






iSTEM

This exciting course is being offered for the first time to students in Year 9 as an elective. St Clair High School is one of a few schools across Western Sydney to receive endorsement to run iSTEM. iSTEM is a course focused on future technologies. Students have been developing their skills in the area of STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics) which research indicates is the fastest growing field in the world. It offers hands on learning experiences through inquiry based learning activities where problem solving skills are integral to the students' development in 21st century learning opportunities. Term One has seen students working with ASTE renewable energy kits to solve problems relating to electric circuitry and solar power. This term will see the class delve into the world of Mechatronics and robotics using the Lego EV3. We will also be exploring the Engineering and Science concepts behind the rides at Luna Park.










SCIENCE CLUB


Leadership PATHE



NILS loans can be used for Educational expenses including: Fees, Text Books, Uniforms (with school logo), Camps & Laptops. (All items must be new, not second hand).





NILS loans have No Interest, No Fees and No Charges.

- Loan amounts are between \$300 \$1,200.
- Repayments are negotiated at an affordable amount over 12 months.
- Clients must have a health care card/pension card or be on a low income (under \$45,000 a year).
- Lived in the same area for a minimum of 3 months.
- Show a willingness and capacity to repay.

NIL loans are also used for essential goods and services including: Whitegoods, Furniture, Health Items, Car Regidtration and Repairs etc.


