<u>Junior Students</u>

A reminder that students in Years 7 to 10 are not permitted to leave the school grounds at any time during the school day (8.25 am -2.30 pm) without signing out at the Front Office. Students seeking permission to leave are asked to bring a signed note from a parent that they have signed by one of the Deputy Principals before 8.25 am. The student then shows their teacher the note at the time they need to leave and then they are able to sign out at the Front Office. Students in Years 7 to 10 are not permitted to leave the school grounds during recess and lunch breaks to visit the shopping centre. Any student leaving school premises without permission is considered to be truanting.

HSC Examinations

Monday 5th November – Wednesday 7th November 2018

This was a three-day residential Visual Arts camp that provided students with an opportunity to develop and experiment their artmaking skills under the guidance of professional, experienced team of wonderful artists and Visual Arts Teachers. The workshops rotated four times, so this allowed the students to experience a range of different workshops such as Painting, Sculpture, Printmaking, Photography, Drawing and Site Specific Installations in the environment. The students produced and created an outstanding Body of Works over the duration of the camp and the students were totally exhausted by the end of the each day, but they had fun and enjoyed the whole experience.

The venue was held a Blue Gum Lodge, Springwood, the cost of the camp was \$320.00 dollars which covered two nights' accommodation, food, tutors, diary, art materials, movies and a African Drumming workshop.

At the art camp the emphasis was placed on being inspired and making connections with the landscape and the natural environment, artists and their own Artist Practice. The students produced artworks that were creative, innovative, amazing and exciting. While the students were challenged and pushed they generated fresh meaning through learning strategies, collaboration and exchange through imagination, experimentation, risk-taking, creative processes and critical thinking.

There were 54 students that attended the camp from a variety of schools for gifted and talented Visual Arts students. Five of those students were from St Clair High School. The students were commended on their behaviour and participation during the art camp not only by staff but also from the tutors and venue.

I would also like to congratulate and thank the students, tutors, teachers. To the parents for supporting their children and giving them the opportunity to attend the art camp, for dropping them off and picking them up and attending the exhibition. I also like to congratulate and acknowledge the Coordinator Officer for Arts in Action (Melissa Jacka) for her valuable contribution to the Art Camp. She did a wonderful job with the organisation of the Visual Arts Camp, Melissa organised emails, fees, payments, well-being, schedules, ordering of art materials, games and equipment and without her guidance and valuable experienced and effective teamwork the art camp would have not rang so efficiently.

Some safety messages – please help!

From time to time it's important to remind everyone about some things that need constant attention. We ask every parent for your understanding and support in relation to the following;

- Full school uniform includes the correct footwear. No parent should allow their son or daughter to come to school without safe footwear. Fashionable canvas shoes, no matter what colour are not safe and should not be worn to school under any circumstances. Yes, everyone, both junior and senior students!
- Deodorant sprays are a health hazard to some of our students and staff. Please understand that some people suffer from Asthma and other related respiratory conditions and spray deodorants can cause a serious risk to them. Please don't allow your children to bring these to school. Also, if your child does suffer from Asthma we ask that you provide the school with your child's Asthma Action Plan. Pro-formas are available from our Library SASS staff to assist you in the preparation of this important document.
- Please be aware that the school day starts at 8-30am. Students are expected to be at school when

In the interest of safety, please help us out!

From time to time it's understandable that your son or daughter may become unwell at school. We have strict procedures in place to manage these situations. This involves contact by the school administrative staff to a parent, caregiver or emergency contact person. This contact must come through the school, not directly to you from your son's or daughter's mobile phone. There have been some occasions when students have used their phone from a classroom (which is in breach of school policy anyway) and asked a parent to come to school to collect them. When the parent arrives, the school is unaware that the student is sick or has called the parent. Please ensure that if your child calls you, that you refer them to the front office and then contact the school to advise them of the call you have received before coming to the school.

A word of caution!

Most people get pretty excited about the amazing advances we are exposed to in the area of technology. Digital cameras, mobile phones that can do just about anything and cute little listening devices are all amongst the array of things to which we have easy access. Like most things though, there can be a catch.

All students and parents need to be aware that it is potentially a breach of privacy legislation to take photographs or make recordings of any sort without the knowledge of the subject. That is especially the case if the photo or recording is distributed in any way without the consent of the subject. This includes the posting of such images on the internet in places like You Tube or Facebook. Please ensure that your children are aware that they should not take and "post" photos or videos of other people without their consent.

The advice of Police is that when we are aware that a student has posted such an item, we are to immediately confiscate the device and provide it to the Police for use as evidence in any subsequent proceedings.
